

JOHN CUNNINGHAM

- 1832 - Born Feb. 29, Marietta, Ohio
- 1856 - Went to sea after mother's death. Shipwrecked. Feet frozen. Learned to read while in hospital. Went into oyster business on N. J. coast. Business failed when rebels sank boat in coastal trade.
- 1862 - Visited sister, Catherine Chandler, in New Gloucester. Met Lucy Ellen True.
- 1862 - Enlisted in Civil War.
- ? - Enlisted again for Hewett Chandler.
- 1865 - Mustered out in August. Worked for Andrew Chandler, brother-in-law.
- 1867 - Married Lucy November 9.
- 1868 - Alice Winthrop born.
- 1875 - Sold Bradbury place, Cobbs Br. Rd.
- 1877 - Bought Intervale farm from N and W. Shurtleff.
- 1880 - Ernest Newcomb born, April 7
- 1882 - Mary Ellen born, December 29
- 1887 - Built new house.
- 1892 - Observed 25th. wedding anniversary.
- 1894 - Died from injuries following accident in which horse had been frightened by train.

LUCY CUNNINGHAM MARSH

- 1846 - Born Jan. 16, Meadowbrook district of New Gloucester.
- 1862 - Met John Cunningham.
- 1867 - Lucy and John married Nov. 9
- 1868 - Alice Winthrop born, Aug. 18
- 1877 - Bought farm, Intervale
- 1880 - Ernest Newcomb born, Apr. 7
- 1882 - Mary Ellen born, Dec. 29.
- 1887 - Built new house.
- 1888 - Took in under contract Aunt Lucy and Uncle Nat True to live in front and back parlors.
- 1892 - Observed 25th. anniversary.
- 1894 - Husband died.
- 1897 - Married Wm. Marsh of New Gloucester.
- 1898 - Uncle Nat died.
- 1901 - Aunt Lucy died.
- 1922 - Observed 25th. anniversary with Wm. Marsh.
- 1926 - Died, Nov. 3.
- 1932 - Wm. Marsh died.

25th. Regiment of the Maine Volunteers. Enlisted at Portland, Me. Transported on the steamer Merrimack to New Orleans. Served in the Red River campaign. Participated in the battle of Gabin Crossroads, the battle of Pleasant Hill, and numerous encounters of the Army of the Shenandoah. Mustered out at Savannah, Georgia.

The Intervale farm purchased in 1877 consisted of 75 acres with buildings plus 30 acres of pasture on the west side of the road and a wood lot of 40 acres on the opposite side of the road. Apparently John and Lucy occupied the original house built by Wm. Widgery on the property he had acquired from the 3rd. division of land in 1797 until they built a new house in 1887 farther back from the road and at the opposite end of the barn. The age of the barn is not known nor the dates when the hay barn and the carriage house were built.

Upon their marriage Wm. Stockman Marsh moved to Lucy's farm where he lived until a year after her death. The property remained in her name.
